



While rehabilitation work at the American Legion Post is ongoing, work to stabilize the building is complete including window repair.





The Spartanburg Post 28 American Legion Building was built during 1936 and 1937 and is significant for its unusual granite Colonial Revival form and its association with the Works Progress Administration (WPA). The building, designed by the internationally-recognized engineering firm Lockwood, Greene & Company, was formally dedicated on November 11, 1937 to coincide with Armistice Day. The American Legion provided the materials, engineering, and some of the equipment used in the construction of the building. It was listed in the National Register April 18, 2003. The American Legion still owns the building and received a 2005 Federal Historic Preservation Fund Grant for much needed window repairs. Since the City of Spartanburg is a Certified Local Government with the National Park Service, the American Legion was eligible to receive this stabilization grant through the city.
